Maybe you need to get to know your client better to appreciate what they're going through; why they need a report, etc. Maybe you need to take the time to figure out why a coworker can't get a project completed rather than finishing it for them.

We can be part of that difference by viewing our businesses as platforms for a greater good and taking responsibility to be of service to others that we work with every day.
